What to expect in the months ahead for Santa Barbara Fly Fishers

At our first face-to-face club meeting in two years (March) we were advised by Lew Riffle that the Board and he could no longer continue as the leaders of the club. He suggested the club had to decide what it wanted to do. A suggestion was made to simply close the club and join with the Sespe FF in Ventura, but if members wanted to continue in Santa Barbara we'd have to figure out how to proceed.

There was a lot of discussion about the options, and Mark Rockwell suggested that we form a small sub-committee of members to simply discuss the possibility of keeping the club going, and work out what is required to keep the club viable.

Eleven members volunteered to be in this "re-organization" committee, and Lew and others were invited to participate. It was decided that Mark Rockwell would organize a Zoom meeting for March 21st and the group would have a chance to talk about what it would take to keep the club functional in the year ahead. CONSERVATION NEWS

Well, it's that time of year when we all start thinking about spring fishing, be it trout, stripers, bass or other prey. To say the least, this has been the worst start to any year in history relative to precipitation in California. As I write this we're hearing that a good storm is coming in tomorrow, but I've heard that several times before without success. Let's hope we do get at least something to help.

Last year you may remember the summer cautions about not fishing during the mid day if the water temperatures are above 67 degrees, and to consider not fishing at all if the days are hot and the water conditions are not good for fish. All of this is likely to hold true again in 2022. I just hate to think we're going through this again, but sometimes the reality does not meet our expectations. So, let's be cautious if conditions again are bad for cold water fish like trout.

KLAMATH DAM REMOVAL MOVES INTO THE HOME STRETCH

I spoke a lot last year about the progress on dam removal in the Klamath, with a start date of January, 2023. Well, we received the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) in late February. In comparing the impacts of dam re-removal to current conditions, the DEIS concludes that dam removal provides significant economic, environmental, and cultural benefit to northern California and southern Oregon. This conclusion is consistent with the findings of two other Environmental Impact Studies that evaluated dam removal over the past two decades. This was the best we could have hoped for from FERC, as it means the agency responsible for dams in America is on our side.

However, it came with 20 recommended actions by FERC that benefit us in the long run because it reduces the chance of legal action and makes conditions better for local communities. *(continued, next page)*

The Klamath River Renewal Corp and the signatories (NCCFFI & others) agreed to the

listed actions. The problem for all of us was that it pushed the start date into 2023, and dam decommissioning to January, 2024.

All of us are disappointed for this additional year, but also realize that if we have to litigate it's likely to take much more than a year, and the recommendations are important and impactful.



So, Pre-construction work will begin in mid-2023 to include alterations to bridges, road work for construction, and other infrastructure changes, as well as water system improvement for Yreka.



Included in this pre-construction will be the teardown of Copco II dam, as it is small and does not have silt behind it. So, Copco I will come out next year, with the other 3 out starting in January, 2024, and completion of removal by October that year. Following the removal, restoration of the dam footprints begins in earnest.

Resource Environmental Solutions (RES) - will immediately start to bring back the river banks and surrounding watershed to its natural appearance and stability. This is a multi-year project with a 2 years implementation and 7 year monitoring and restoration plan in place.

TROUT IN THE CLASSROM

TROUT IN THE CLASSROOM

TIC is a program designed to allow our youth to experience raising trout in their school classroom. It intends to teach elementary and secondary students about trout and their biology, ecology, conservation and environmental stewardship. Through a classroom experience of hatching fish eggs and coordinated academic activities, students experience first-hand the value of aquatic environments, the balance that must be met to maintain and preserve California's fisheries and aquatic habitats, and how their personal actions affect these valuable resources.

Trout in the Classroom (TIC) programs have been in place all across the country for more than 30 years. Trout in the Classroom is a relatively simple program. Teachers set up an aquarium and incubate trout eggs in their classroom, under the guidance of a Trout in the Classroom coordinator (in our case, a SBFF Youth Committee member). Together, they ensure that all of the equipment has been purchased and is assembled properly. While the program varies from state to state, in general the teacher and students are responsible for daily maintenance and observation of the eggs, while the coordinator is responsible for obtaining permits and locating a certified egg source.

The final result is an aquarium full of trout fry that is released into a state-approved body of water during a class field trip. Trout in the Classroom is an extremely rewarding program for students, teachers, and mentors.

The Santa Barbara Flyfishers club has been active in TIC for a long time. We currently sponsor two TIC sessions per year, in the winter and spring. The winter session runs from Thanksgiving through January and typically involves a half dozen schools. The spring session, running from March through May is more active with about a dozen schools participating. We support schools from Ventura all the way up to Orcutt. We have sponsored classes from first grade all the way through high school. Some schools implement the TIC program in their science labs which allows many classes to participate. Many teachers participate year after year, but we typically conduct one or two training sessions per year for new teachers.

These training sessions introduce the TIC program to the teachers and help them get started. Teachers are also provided with a full curriculum of lessons from which to choose for their particular class. We get the trout eggs for our classes from the Fillmore Hatchery. Since the Fillmore facility does not have any brood stock, the eggs originally come from either the Mt. Whitney or the Hot Creek facilities. When the eggs are delivered to Fillmore, we go get our allotment and travel from school to school delivering eggs to the classes. This can be an all-day process in the spring session. The students are then responsible to raise the trout from eggs to fry, including feeding them, cleaning the aquarium and changing out the water periodically. The fry, a little over one inch long, are released into Cachuma Lake when the session has been completed.

We have a limited number of aquarium systems that are available for classes to borrow, and many schools have purchased their own systems. Our current winter session is taking place at Marymount, Santa Barbara Junior High, Open Alternative, Vieja Valley Elementary, Montessori in Goleta, and the Cachuma Lake Nature Center.

Lake Cachuma | by Doc Ceder

LAKE CACHUMA IS A 9000-ACRE RESERVOIR LOCATED 30 MINUTES FROM SANTA BARBARA IN THE FOOTHILLS.

It is administered by the Parks and Recreation department and has facilities for camping, launching, and boat rentals.

There is a \$10 admission fee.

A FEW RULES

The lake does not allow body contact with the water, so no float tubes or pontoon are allowed. Kayaks and canoes are permitted. All boats are inspected for mussel contamination.



WHAT SPECIES ARE IN THE LAKE?

The lake contains both small and largemouth bass, along with a good population of crappie and catfish. Trout plants are monthly during the winter up to may. Fly fishing success varies from season to season. Spring is the best time with the crappie starting to bunch up in March and head to the shallows in April. Smallmouth spawn earlier in April and can be found in the deeper parts on the lake. May and June bring on the largemouth to the shallows with the water temperature in the sixties. Summer fly fishing is best early and lake in the day near the shore, and deeper midday. Fall time the shad minnows group together in deeper water and heavy sinking lines under the bait balls will work. Winter fly fishing can be slow due to cold water temperature.

I USE THREE FLY SETUPS FOR THE LAKE:

- 8wt rod with fast sinking line, 2-4ft 12# fluorocarbon leader and a weighted fly like a clouser minnow. I use this rig during the cooler water months and mid-day summer fishing.
- 6wt rod with a #3 sink line 4-5 ft 8# mono leader and a non-weighted minnow fly like a Murdich minnow pattern.
- 8wt rod a floating weight forward line 7-8 ft #12 stiff mono leader. I use a white or yellow popper or gurgler fished close to the shore early/late in spring and summer. Also, I use the same setup but remove top water fly and add a bobber with a 3-8 ft 8# dropper and a black #8 leech or 1/16 jig fly in a shad pattern, the rid has caught all species including catfish, and trout.

To summarize, the best fly fishing is from a boat in the spring. if you want to learn the lake, I recommend contacting Casey Cloud who guides the lake year around. His number is 805-689-4687.


