This Month's Program Utah's Green River with Larry Basham

The Green River in north east Utah's Flaming Gorge Country is recognized as one of the West's Blue Ribbon trout rivers with estimates of 12,000 to 15,000 fish per mile! The river begins in Wyoming and enters the Flaming Gorge Reservoir then extends as a tailwater river for thirty miles eventually reaching Colorado. There are three different fishing habitats designated as Sections A, B and C which are home to trophy sized rainbow and brown trout with some cutthroat too. Larry Basham will present this month's program showing photos of his experiences fishing the scenic Green River. The red canyon walls, crystal clear water and abundant wildlife are only second to the brightly colored abundant trout. If you haven't fished the Green River, you'll put it on your bucket list after this program and if you have fished it, you'll want to go back again!

WHISKEY IS FOR DRINKING; WATER IS FOR FIGHTING OVER

I want to take the time this summer to share information on water and what we collectively can do to make a difference. My goal is to make our voice stronger in the politics of water management for the environment. Please share your thoughts with me in any manner of communication, I want to hear from you.

If you haven't already, or maybe it's just time to revisit it again, I am appealing to all of you to take a look at your landscaping and how much potable water you use to maintain it. It seems our voice is weakened in the state's water management arena when we don't place a value on the use of potable water in a semi-arid environment. Place a value on environmental uses!

I spend time on local water management. Our region seems to be failing at conserving outdoor water use. There is a finite amount of water, and if we as fly fishers support significant reductions in outdoor water use our lobby efforts in Sacramento to give more water to the environment may have a larger voice.

- Las Virgenes Municipal Water District imports 100% of its water supply. It delivers water to 70,000 households. A survey conducted in the LVMWD service area shows that nearly **70% of the water served is used outdoors, primarily for landscaping.**
- Los Angeles Department of Water and Power imports about 50% of its water supply, and 50% of the water served is for outdoor use. LADWP serves 4 million people.
- Statewide, residential use puts 50% of potable water delivered on landscaping.

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO MAKE OUR FISH VOICE LOUDER:

- Remove decorative turf areas. Decorative turf in all settings, not just industrial and commercial, needs to stop. Lawns consume 40-60% of landscaping water.
- Install drought tolerant Mediterranean plants. If you install local native plants you will be helping to protect our unique environment, found on only 2% of Earth.
- Reuse your water more than once. Install a grey water system in your home.
- Support Pure Water Projects, where highly treated water is sent back into the potable water distribution system. I am aware of one in San Diego, Orange County and the Santa Monica Mountains.

- WATER TEMPERATURE CONTINUES TO WARM UP, SO THE BASS ARE MORE ACTIVE AND CLOSER TO SHORELINE.
- EARLY MORNING TOP WATER NETTED 10 LARGEMOUTH ON A YELLOW GURGLER. BASS HOLDING AROUND STICKUPS.
- AFTER 9AM FISH HEAD INTO DEEPER WATER, SO SINKING LINES WITH MINNOW FLYS, OR A BOBBLE/DROPPER RIG 8-9FT WITH 1/6 SHAD JIG FLY CLOSE TO STEEP BANKS.
- EVENING FISHING HAS BEEN GOOD ONCE WIND DROPS OFF.



MAY 19, 2022

- FISHED FROM 6:30AM TO NOON
- 6 TOP WATER FISH WITH WELLOW GURGLER
- 6 BASS WITH MIXTURE STRIPPING #3 SINK LINE SHORT 12# LEADER AND WEIGHTED MINNOW FLY, AND 3 WITH BOBBLE-DROPPER RIG 7FT DEEP 16TH OUNCE SHAD JIG FLY.
- WIND COMES UP EARLY PM
- RAMP OPENS AT 6AM
- CLOSES NOW A 8PM

MAY 5, 2022

- FISHED FROM 6;30 AM TO NOON.
- 5 LARGEMOUTH ONE SMALLMOUTH ON TOP WATER GURGLERS.
- ONE BASS ON FLOAT AND FLY ON FLOAT AND FLT RIG.
- NO CRAPPIES THIS WEEK.
- WATER GETTING WARMER AND BASS MORE ACTIVE.
- BASS AROUND STICKUPS.



We stayed with the deep nymph rig in the first couple of spots and Dick landed a pair of nice bows. Then we switched to a short leash nymph rig and Craig connected with a beauty 19" bow. The fishing was off the charts for the rest of the day.

In one stretch Dick had 3 fish in a row, 2 rainbows and one brown that were all in the 20" range. Another spot produced 3 nice trout on 3 casts for Craig. There were several good doubles and fish on the line all the way down the river today.

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Mixed weather, but great fishing again on the Missouri!

Monday was scheduled to be the first of 4 days with long-time anglers Dick and Craig. As bad luck would have it, I had to cancel out on short notice. I enlisted the help of the local fly shops and fortunately Headhunters was able to find a guide on short notice that could get Craig and Dick out for a half day. I was happy to hear that the guys made it out onto the water and caught some nice trout with fellow guide, Jason.

Tuesday morning I was able to get out on the river with Dick and Craig. With cloudy skies and little wind it was the perfect chance to get down in the canyon. Right below the confluence with the Dearborn both guys stuck nice fish and Craig landed a bright 18" bow. The action continued from there as the guys picked off several mid-sized trout in the next run. All of the spots were producing as we had plenty of action in the morning. It was mostly those mid-sized rainbows and browns but there were enough 17+" fish eating to keep it interesting. The fishing only improved in the afternoon when the mayflies started hatching.

MONTANA FLY FISHING - CONTINUED

The guys capped off the day perfectly as they landed a great double with 17" and 19" bows in the net right at the take out. I felt terrible for missing out on yesterday, but I think we made up for it today.

Wednesday I took Dick and Craig up to the Gates of the Mountains in the jet boat.

Dick had mentioned he wanted to fish the "Land of the Giants" this winter and it was a perfect weather to make the run.



We motored up to the top in the morning and started off with deep nymph rigs. We averaged a hook up per run with one double in the morning. Craig did the heavy lifting early with a few fat football shaped rainbows while Dick tangled with some of the feisty males.

Craig had a particularly large fish he hooked that ran straight upstream and never stopped. The hook finally popped free and we will never know how big that one actually was. We had a number of other early releases too.

After lunch we made a couple more passes on the upper run and hooked a few more before dropping downriver for the rest of the day. That is when Dick came to life with a few thick rainbows.



Craig had a monster on for a while that gave us a big jump to show his full size before finally throwing the hook. Right after that Dick connected on the best fish of the day. It was a big hen well north of 20" and very heavy.

We didn't catch the number of fish we saw yesterday, but the average size was impressive today and the guys were impressed with the scenery and the experience in the Gates.

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MONTANA FLY FISHING - CONTINUED

Thursday was my last day with Dick and Craig. A heavy downstream wind was forecast so we picked a long float and started at Wolf Creek.

The morning was calm and mostly cloudy, and the fishing was everything you could ask for. I rowed up above the bridge and Craig hooked up on a jumping rainbow on his first cast. He had two more by the time we floated under the bridge and then the guys had 2 consecutive doubles in the next spot. All morning long Craig and Dick were banging fish in every single run. Even when the wind started to pick up it didn't slow down our action at all.



We ate lunch as out of the wind as we could, and after 2 more doubles in our next spot on the deep nymph rig, we switched over to the short leash rods for the rest of the day. The morning fishing had been excellent, and despite the persistent wind the afternoon was even better. Hot rainbows and browns were smashing little blue wing nymphs in every spot we fished. It was so good that I started fishing water I normally don't just to see what would happen. Every run, every spot, every bucket produced. Craig even caught a couple simply trying to switch from the left to right side of the boat.

The guys doubled up a bunch of times today and we even had a couple triple doubles where one guy got 2 while the other angler was still landing one. It was what I call, as good as it gets type of fishing. Craig and Dick were hooked up all day long on a wide variety of trout. It mostly rainbows, but a good number of browns too.

We landed 7 or 8 that were in the 19-20+" range, a bunch of fat and healthy 15-17" trout and plenty of spunky 12-14 inchers too. I have always enjoyed fishing with Dick and Craig, and I am glad they had such great fishing on this trip!

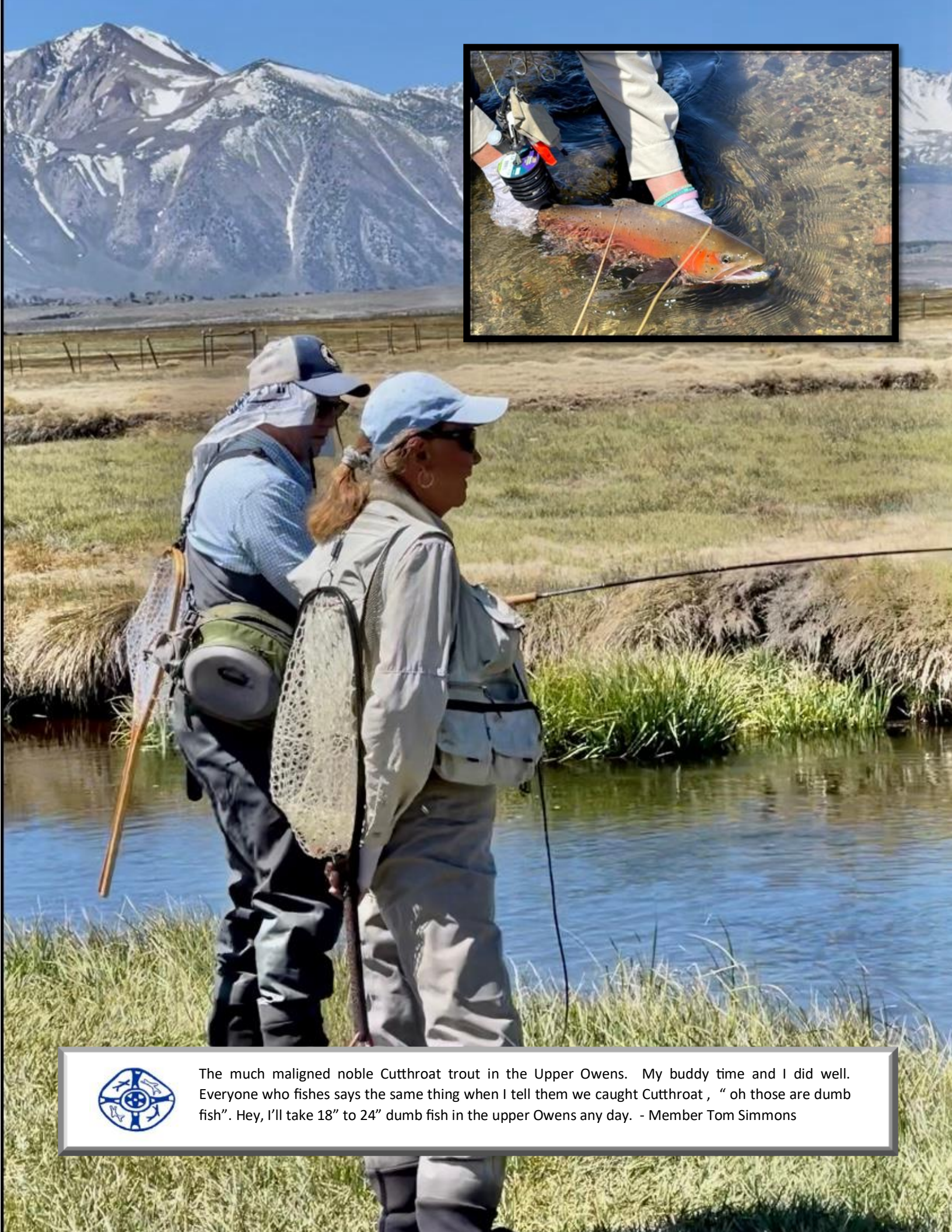

SIZZLING SUMMER AHEAD

Summer officially starts on Tuesday, June 21, 2022, and it will be another scorcher. We all look forward to the summer months and enjoy spending more time outdoors fly fishing, but with the warmer temperatures, it's important to remember to stay hydrated during outdoor activities. Heat exhaustion and dehydration aren't something to take lightly. They can develop quickly and if left untreated, can lead to heatstroke. I confess I didn't think about it much until it happened to me one summer while fishing in the Lamar Valley. Luckily my friend recognized the symptoms, knew what to do, and acted quickly.

BEAT THE HEAT

How do you prevent heat exhaustion during the summer? Here are a few tips and tricks to help you avoid overheating and enjoy your summer fun!

- **Stay Cool** – Choose lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing. Sprinkle water over your skin or clothing and place a damp cloth on your neck. Wetting your sun buff and wrapping it around your neck is a great way to stay cool. If you are hiking a long way on a warm day, consider wet wading or packing in your waders.
- **Drink Up** – Stay hydrated by sipping from a water bottle throughout the day. Aim for at least a half-gallon over the course of a day, and don't wait until you are thirsty to drink. It's easy to forget and dehydration can creep up on you quickly. Drinking electrolytes also helps your body stay calibrated and cool. Avoid excess caffeine or alcohol, which can dehydrate you (don't shoot the messenger).
- **Be An Early Bird** – It's good for you. It's good for the fish, and by fishing in the early morning or dusk, you avoid the day's heat.

WHAT TO DO IF IT HAPPENS TO YOU

Heat exhaustion occurs when the body becomes dehydrated and is unable to regulate its internal body temperature. If you notice that you (or your fishing buddy) have the following symptoms:

- Cold, pale, clammy skin
- Fast or weak pulse
- Nausea or vomiting
- Tiredness or weakness
- Dizziness or fainting, or a headache

Move immediately to a cool place, loosen your clothes, sip water, and put cool, wet clothes on your body. My friends dumped me in the stream until my body temperature was back to normal, the symptoms subsided, and I was able to stumble back up out of the Bison-laden valley. I'd be remiss if I didn't take a moment here to emphasize the importance of the buddy system. I was glad to have two buddies watching out for me on that day. I'm not sure I would have made it out without them.
